"We are also over the moon to have soprano Judith Howarth and baritone Jolyon Loy performing with us in the Vaughan Williams piece, and to once again have teamed up with the excellent McOpera Ensemble.

Andrew explains: "Judith is one of Britain's most successful sopranos, who has performed internationally, and Jolyon is currently studying at the Alexander Gibson Opera School at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland - he is one to watch.'

Following its hugely successful 50th anniversary programme, which included a gala dinner and gala performances of Handel's Messiah and Bach's Mass in B Minor, the Remembrance Sunday concert will be Bearsden Choir's first public performance of the new season.

The 2019-2020 programme will also include a concert on December 12 in St John's Renfield Church featuring Fauré's Requiem and Vivaldi's Gloria: a performance of Mendelssohn's Elijah in the City Halls on May 10; and a trip to Halifax on October 13, to join the illustrious Halifax Choral Society in a performance of Verdi's Requiem.

"Around 80 of our 140 members will travel down for the concert and everyone is extremely excited about this opportunity."

The 2020-21 season will include performances of Bach's St Iohn Passion and Brahms' German Requiem, plus a repeat of its successful Choral Education Project when, in 2016, 280 school children from 11 schools across Greater Glasgow came together with the choir, orchestra and professional soloists in a performance of Haydn's Nelson

"This was a fantastic opportunity for young people who may not otherwise have had the chance to sing classical choral music," says John. "Planning is still at an early stage, but the intention is to extend the invitation to more schools, to allow even more pupils to take part and join the choir in a performance of Handel's Messiah.'

This is a project particularly close to Andrew Nunn's heart. The young conductor works

closely with a number of youth choirs, including the National Youth Choir of Northern Ireland and NYCOS, the National Youth Choir of Scotland, Since 2012 he has been Director of Choirs

Bearsden Choir was formed in 1968 at the behest of the Provost at the time. David Fisher, who wanted a choir made up of local people to perform Handel's Messiah

The performance took place in Bearsden's Rio Cinema long gone – and it was led by

Harry MacGill, organist of New Kilpatrick Church.

"It was supposed to be a oneoff," smiles John. "However, it was so successful that it just kept going and 51 years later, we are still here and going strong."

The choir has become one of Scotland's finest, collecting awards and acclaim along the way - it has twice reached the finals of BBC2's Sainsbury's Choir of the year competition – and it is a regular at prestigious events such as the opening of the refurbished Kelvingrove Museum and the Glasgow celebrations of Bach's 250th anniversary.

John has been chairman for seven years, and a member since the early 1990s.

"It is a great joy to be part of Bearsden choir," he smiles. "There is a fantastic buzz at our Wednesday night rehearsals and there is nothing quite like the feeling you get when you know you have sung something spectacular, and sung it well."
